HOW DOES TRANSPORTATION WORK?

There are several transportation services available from Malpensa or Linate Airport to your event location but if you would like to use public transportation, see instructions below:

From the Linate Airport

Taxi: It's a 48 minute trip and estimated to be around 35€.

Public transport lines for CIGL: Take bus no. 73 (Aeroporto-San Babila) for 15 stops, get off at the Largo Augusto stop and take bus no. 94 (P.ta Volta-Minghetti) for 8 stops, get off at Resistenza Partigiana Square. Then take bus no. 14 (Cim. Maggiore-Lorenteggio) for 5 stops, get off at the Via Solari-Via Stendhal stop and continue straight for 400 meters. It s a 1H 15 minutes trip and estimated price is 1.50€.

From the Malpensa Airport

Taxi: It's a 1H 30 minute trip and estimated to be around 95€.

Public transport lines for CIGL: Take the express train from Malpensa to Cadorna Station, then take the underground Metro 2 (green line) toward Abbiategrasso/ Assago Forum for 3 stops, get off at Porta Genova. You can find the hotel 900 metres away (Need cross the footbridge to arrive at Via Tortona). It's a 1H 30 minute trip and estimated to be around $13\mathfrak{E} + 1.50\mathfrak{E}$.

Paula Caligiuri is a Distinguished Professor of International Business at Northeastern University. Paula works extensively with leading organizations and universities on the development of individuals' culturally agility. She has authored or co-authored several award-winning research articles and books – including BUILD YOUR CULTURAL AGILITY and CULTURAL AGILITY: BUILDING A PIPELINE OF SUCCESSFUL GLOBAL PROFESSIONALS and GET A LIFE, NOT A JOB. Paula has been a frequent expert guest on CNN and CNN International and is an instructor for a LinkedIn Learning course entitled MANAGING GLOBALLY.

Paula was a semi-finalist for the 2021 Forbes "50 over 50" for co-founding a public benefit corporation, Skiilify, to help foster cross-cultural understanding through the free online tool myGiide. She has served as an Area Editor for the JOURNAL OF INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS STUDIES and as a Senior Editor for

the JOURNAL OF WORLD BUSINESS. She has also served as a visiting professor at Bocconi University in Milan.

Paula holds a Ph.D. from Penn State in Organizational Psychology and is a Fellow of both the Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychology and the Academy of International Business.

Board of the group founded by his father, which operated in various fields ranging from ethical finance, real estate management and consulting particularly in favour of the Catholic Church. 

In May of 2022, Rich published a book to guide and coach all students studying abroad titled "Like a Fish in Water: How to Grow Abroad When You Go Abroad.


