Via + The Forum on Education Abroad partnered together to share data and provide a holistic view of administrator and student perspectives in education abroad.








25% of students who start an application don't submit. Based on the student data below, we know that **program planning time and logistics, academic credit, and financial reasons are the top three barriers to students studying abroad.** If administrators align their strategies to the actual barriers students face, they can better support those in the process to finish their applications.

What are the main barriers to get students abroad? (Administrators)


What are your barriers to go abroad? (Students)

91% U.S. institutions report that barriers are getting in the way of increasing participation











Students plan to finance their education abroad participation largely through scholarships, grants, or financial aid, so investing time and resources in **increasing financial support is a key strategy**.

Faculty-led programs that are 8 weeks or less, internships, and reciprocal exchange programs are among the **most common** types of programs available within education abroad at institutions. Does your institution's portfolio reflect student demand?
